As early as 1883, national sorority officers began exploring the possibility of an intersorority organization. They recognized the value of an association with other sorority groups which would provide the means to share ideas, discuss common problems, establish cooperative programs in specific areas such as rush and housing, and promote, through combined efforts, the sorority system.

U.S.C.'s Panhellenic, or "all greek," Council was formed in the early 1900's. Each undergraduate sorority member has membership in U.S.C.'s Panhellenic, which guides and governs our eleven sororities.
