

KELLY SCOTT MEMORIAL PLAQUE

On Saturday, November 26th, 2022, prior to the USC-Notre Dame game, a group of Beta-Sigma TKE's celebrated the life of one of their brothers with the unveiling of a memorial plaque in the courtyard between Popovich and Fertitta Halls. Kelly Scott, Beta-Sigma #619, passed away in October of 2021 due to a sudden bout with lung cancer. Kelly was beloved by many of his brothers from the 1970's and due to an effort headed by his former roommate Matthew Scanlan, Beta-Sigma 617, and Mike Daoussis, Beta-Sigma 576, the memorial was finally dedicated on campus. Kelly, who grew up in La Jolla, California graduated from USC with a degree from the Marshall School in 1978. Throughout his life Kelly kept in contact with many



joy to think about the experience I had there," Mike says, "It was a great foundation for the rest of my life and career."

Today, Michael serves as the Head of Program Innovation for Newfront and has been working in the insurance industry for over forty years. Along with an illustrious amount of experience developing innovative programs to best serve his clientele, he has been a key player in the rapid growth of his past and present organizations. He and his two sons, both of which have graduated from their respective universities, identify themselves as a 'skiing and snowboarding family.'

Michael specifically remembers a moment from his early days in the chapter when an alumnus came to visit his pledge class. "Take a look around you," he said to the new members, "these guys are going to be your best friends for the rest of your life." Although unsure of this sen-

timent at the time, the very same brothers standing next to Mike ended up being the best men at his wedding eighteen years later.

Including a brief stint as a kicker on the USC football team, Michael's four years in the chapter were plentiful with opportunities and unforgettable memories fostered by his TKE brothers. His advice for current undergraduates is simple: "Enjoy your time there, and don't blink. It'll be over soon."

Michael and his friend Matt Scanlan #617 were instrumental in the creation of a memorial plaque for their late brother Kelly Scott. Mike remembers Kelly not only as one of his greatest friends, but

as family. "He and I would talk three or four times a week. He always had a great, great sense of humor—a very biting sense of humor. I loved it. Being a part of Kelly's family meant everything to me." Kelly was an incredibly loyal alumnus to both the university and TKE and was often seen wearing USC clothing even to company functions and community service events. His plaque, located in the courtyard between the business buildings, was presented in November of last year during a



ceremony with brothers from Kelly's time in TKE.

"The TKE house has given me the best friends I could ever dream of having," says Michael. "To this day, they are my closest friends."


DIVERSITY, EQUITY & INCLUSION

A Special Tribute to **HARVEY PALASH**

We lost a beloved frater, Harvey Palash #186, on March 4, 2023. He was a few weeks short of age 90, and suffered several years from bone marrow cancer.

Harvey transferred as a junior from Los Angeles City College to SC in fall 1953. His leadership and charisma allowed him immediately to be elected Pledge Class President. Later he served as Prytanis his entire senior year, graduating in June 1955 with a degree in political science.

When he succeeded astronaut Jerry Carr as Prytanis, Jerry showed him a closet full of Memorabilia he had quietly pilfered from rival fraternities. He made Harvey promise to not reveal the secret. Unknown to all including the rivals, Harvey secretly returned the entire stash. It wasn't until Jerry's death several years ago that we learned of the skullduggery.

Harvey was always heavily involved in the entertainment industry. He had early employment in labor relations with the American Television and Radio Actors (AFTRA) and the American Broadcasting Company, while attending law school at Loyola College and passing the bar. As a successful entrepreneur he formed three companies: The Palash Agency, Diamond P Enterprises and Diamond P Sports. The latter was sold in 1990 to setup his retirement. His activities involved tennis, golf and reminiscing with old entertainment friends

In 1967 Harvey was connected with The National Hot Rod Association, later being elected to its Board of Directors. It was at NHRA that he met his beloved wife of 25 years, Penny. They lived in Coronado, Indian Wells and most recently Rancho Mirage, California.

Harvey was an exceptional man and will be remembered always for his quiet strength, his gentle and loving soul, and as a consummate gentleman.
